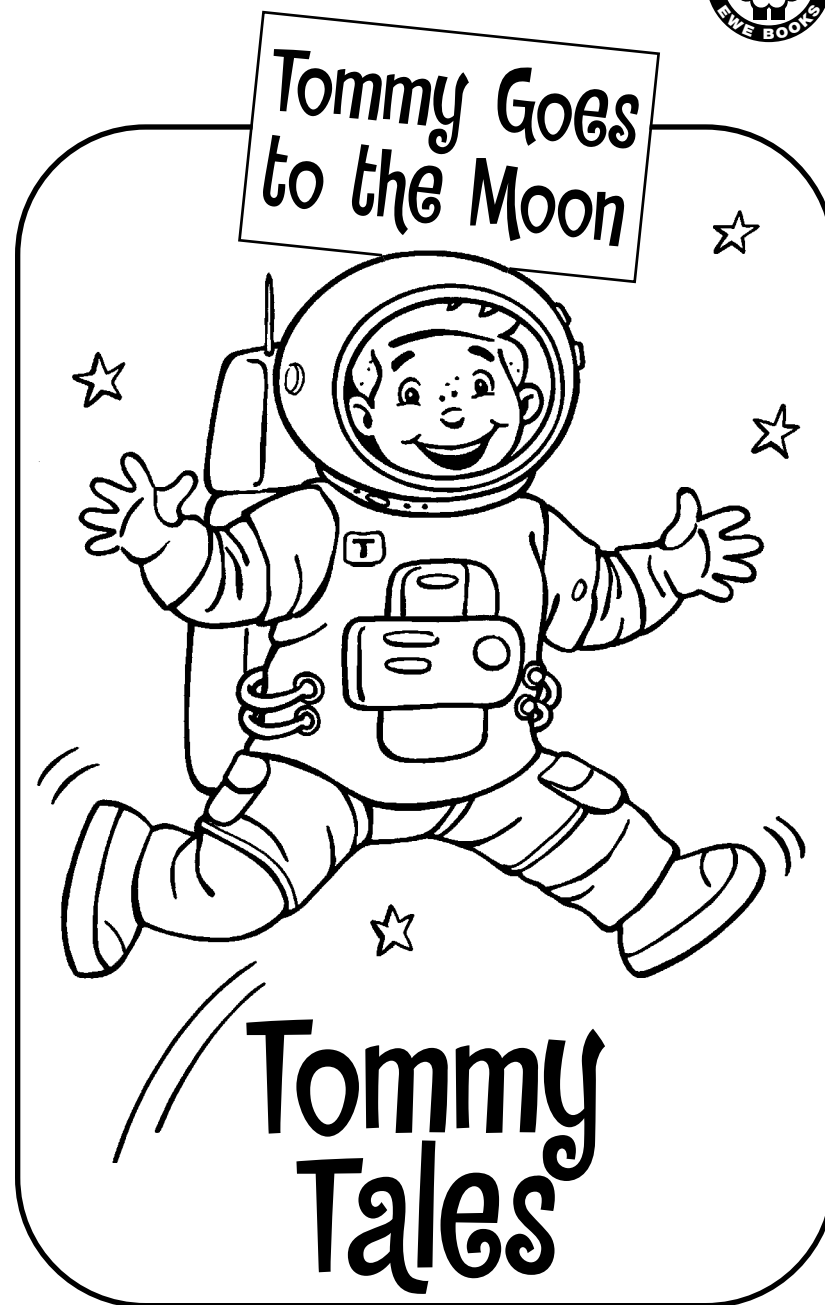

"It's made of cheese," said Sam.

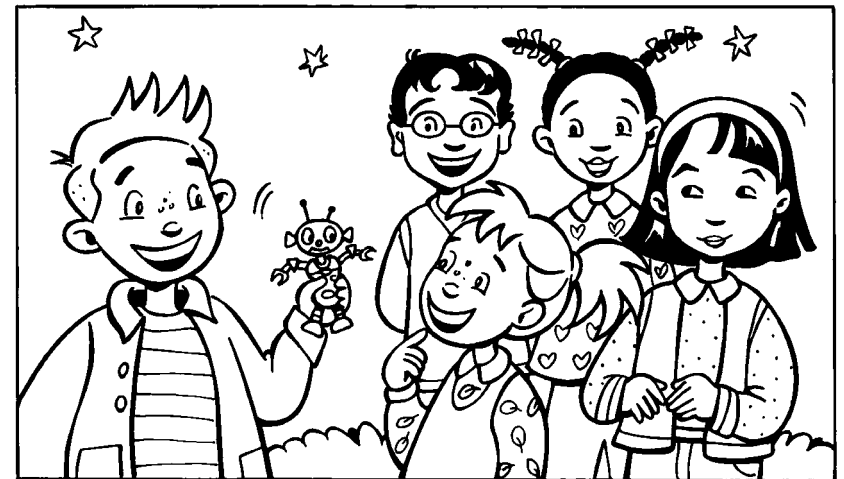
All the others laughed.

When the smoke cleared, the children were no longer sitting on the big blue bench in the park.



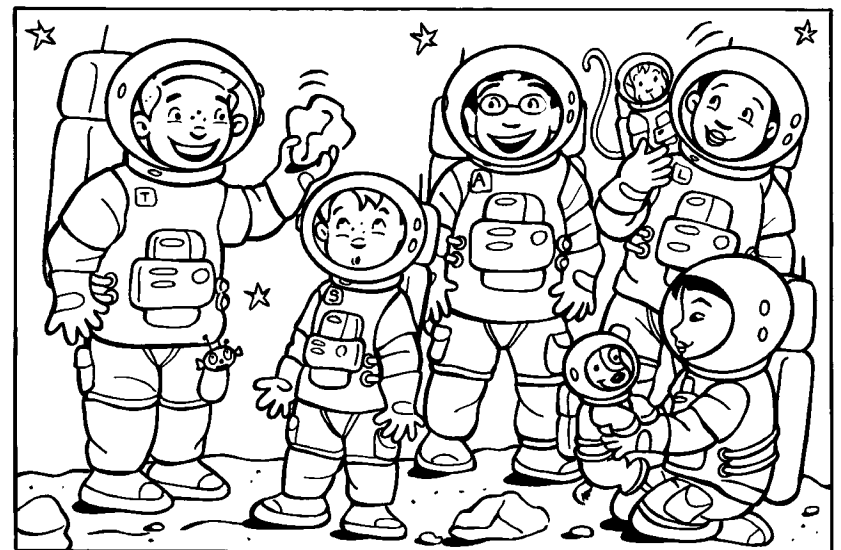

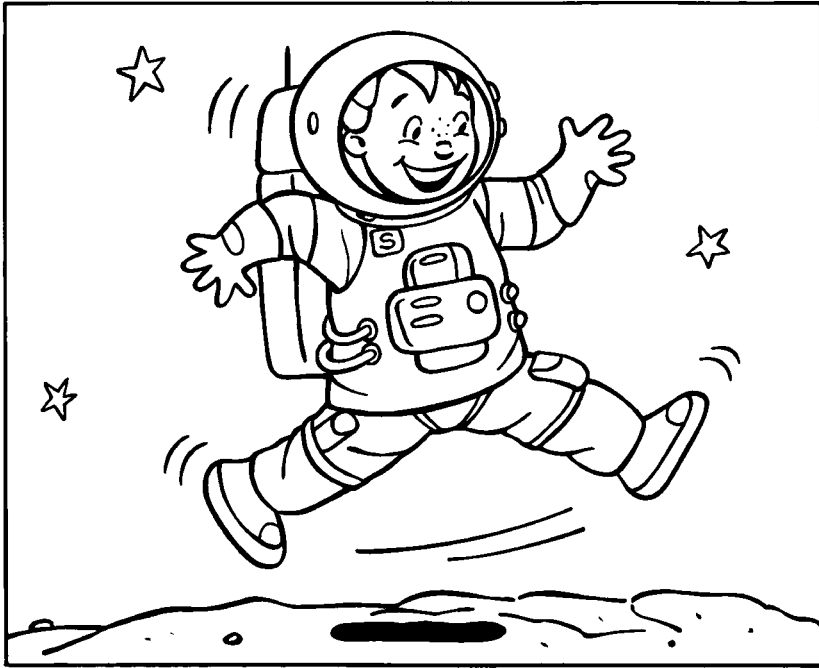
Tommy waved his hands at the others.

“Well, Sam,” laughed Tommy, “these rocks sure don’t feel like cheese.”



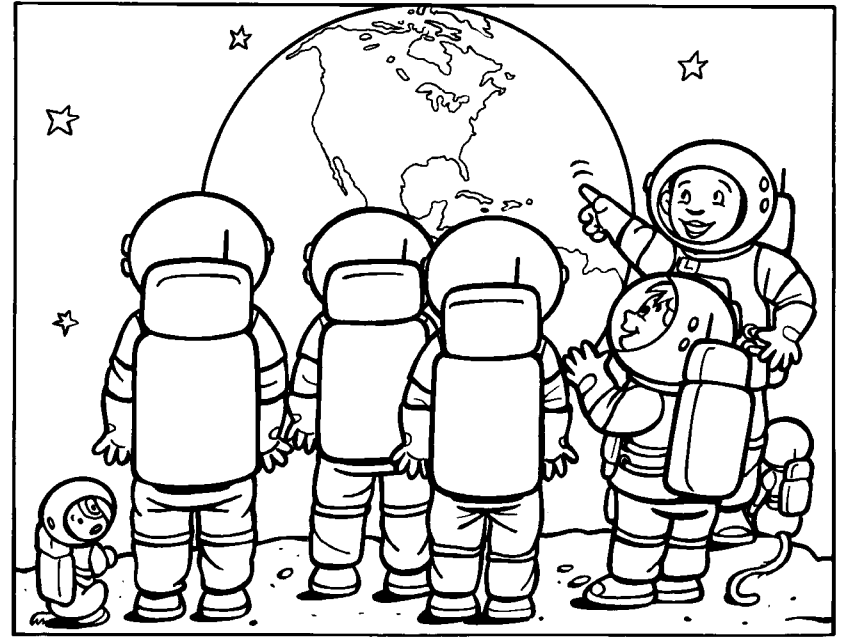


Sam was the first to take a step. “Wow, I feel so light. I’m almost floating,” she giggled.

They were suddenly distracted by barking in their helmets.

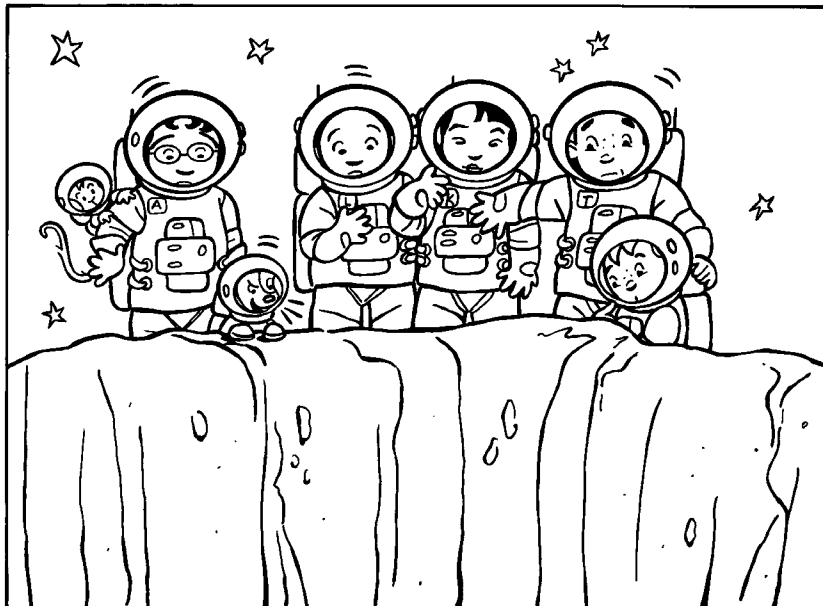
They saw Taffy barking loudly at the edge of a huge hole.

They all reached the edge of the crater.



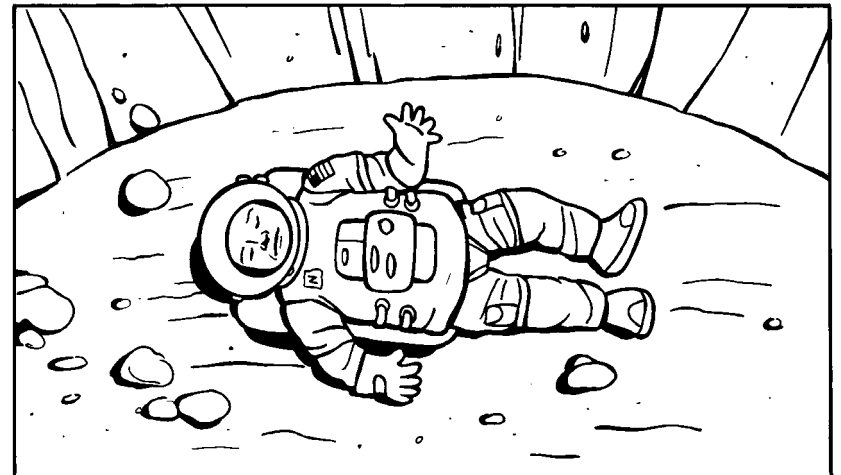
They looked down to see what Taffy was barking at. They were surprised to see an astronaut. He was completely still, lying on his back.

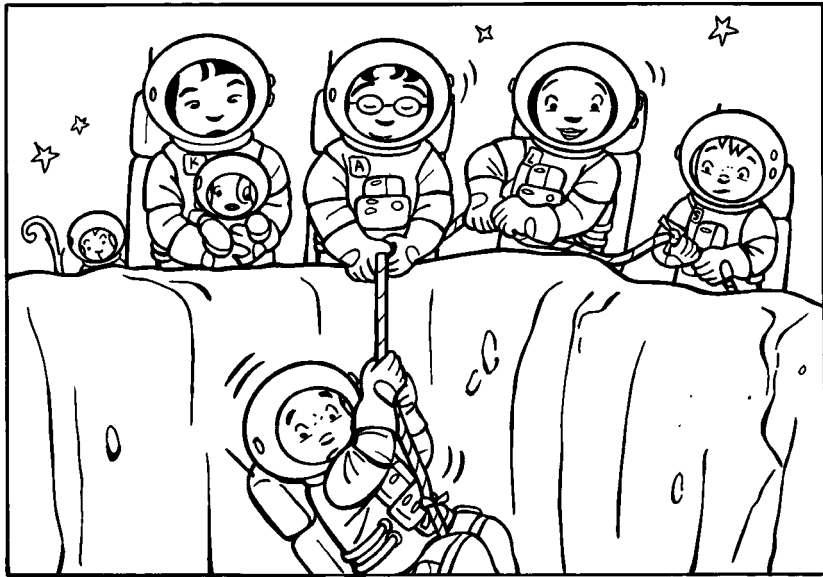
“Is he dead?” asked Sam.

“We have ropes in our backpacks. We’ll tie them together and you all can lower me down,” said Tommy.





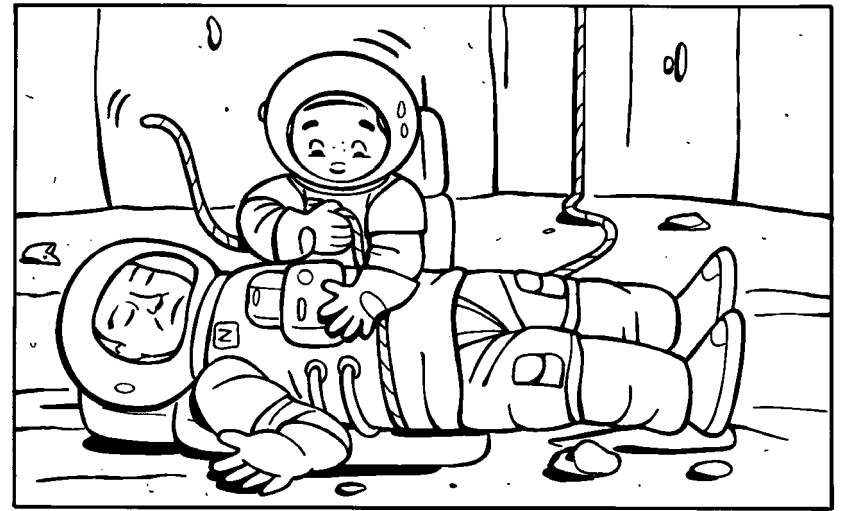
They quickly tied together the five ropes. Tommy then looped the rope around his waist and tied a big knot.

“How come he’s so light?” asked Andy.

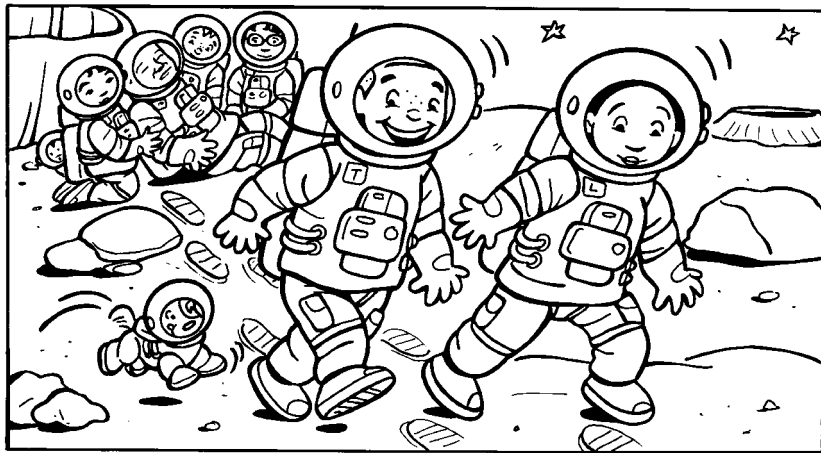
Lucy told him it was because everyone seems about four times lighter on the moon.

They made the astronaut comfortable, then pulled Tommy back up.

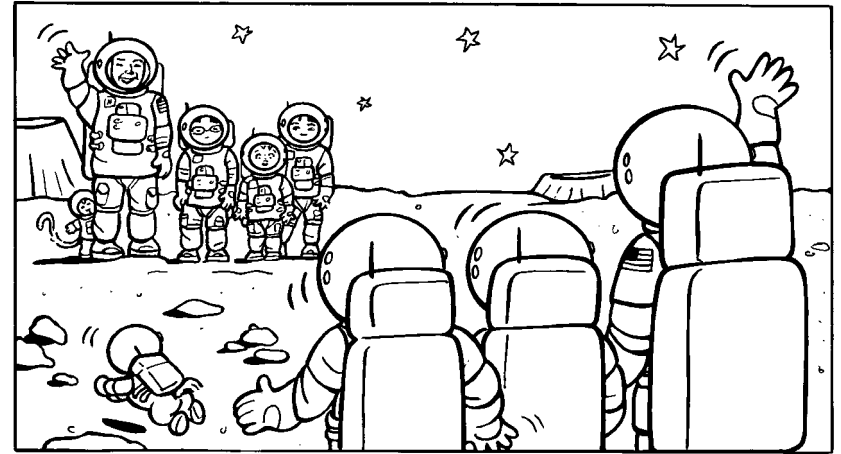
“Who do you think he is?” asked Kim.

“It must be Commander Armstrong. I’ve been searching for him,” replied the astronaut. “Take me to him. By the way, my name is Buzz Aldrin.”

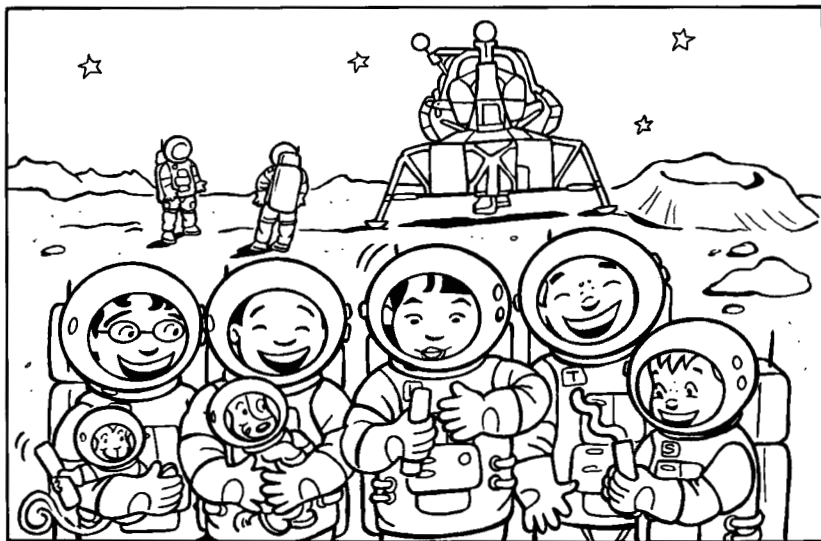
When they got back to the others, Commander Armstrong had recovered.
